



Examples of Programs and Projects in Oregon that would benefit from H.R. 4914, the Coastal Jobs Creation Act of 2010

The Coastal Jobs Creation Act of 2010 (H.R. 4914) is new legislation that will create jobs for fishermen and coastal communities as fish populations rebuild. The following are examples of key programs in Oregon that could benefit from H.R. 4914:

Oregon Marine Debris Prevention and Removal Opportunities

Through the NOAA Marine Debris Prevention and Removal Program, the Coastal Jobs Creation Act would authorize funding to support marine debris removal projects for Oregon's coastal communities. These projects often involve fishermen and their vessels. For example, in 2009, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife used American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funding to employ Oregon off-season fishermen to remove derelict (i.e., lost or abandoned) crab pots and other fishing gear along the Oregon coast. Nearly 90 percent of the funds were used for projects that created or maintained 48 jobs. Of those, 31 were targeted for commercial fishermen impacted by the national economic downturn.¹

Oregon State University Cooperative Research Grants

Oregon Sea Grant supports a wide range of coastal/marine research involving fishermen and coastal communities² that will be eligible for funding under H.R. 4914. For example, in an effort to help restore the Pacific Northwest groundfish fisheries, Sea Grant is paying fishermen in Port Orford up to \$1,000 a day for scientific charters to release pregnant rockfish³ to assess the viability of this restoration approach.

Oregon Urban Waterfront Opportunities

The Coastal Jobs Creation Act would authorize direct funding for waterfront restoration efforts, such as the coastal waterfront and renovation programs that are supported through the Oregon Coastal Management Program (OCMP).⁴ For instance, in 2005, the City of Astoria was awarded a grant through the OCMP for coastal waterfront restoration.⁵ Astoria used this grant and additional assistance to create a 4 mile river walk, which has led to resurgence in the economy of this small coastal community.⁶

Oregon Habitat Restoration Grants

The Coastal Jobs Creation Act authorizes funds for restoring fish and marine mammal habitats. The Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board would be eligible to receive this funding to support its efforts to improve rivers, lakes, streams, wetlands, and fish and wildlife habitat. These programs contribute to the Oregon Plan for Salmon and Watersheds and the Oregon Conservation Strategy.⁷
